The Chordsmen started their singing tour by paying a visit to Wedgewood Estates, an assisted living facility.

Wedgewood has four dinning rooms

and the Chordsmen visited each one and sang several songs for those residents eating lunch.

The chorus was escorted from one dining room to another by our host, and photographer, **Kerstin Feasley.** Each room had its own unique shape and although it was somewhat crowded, we were able



to get formed up in the space available.

We made it work in each of the locations. Assistant directors, **Jim Frye** and **Dave Kracker** shared the duties of keeping the chorus all together.



Some of the dining rooms' décor seemed to be the same, but each room had its own group of enthusiastic diners.



In one of the dining rooms, we saw a former Chordsmen, **Wayne Keifer** (in black shirt). A lot of us remembered him singing with the chorus in days past. I bet he remembered some of the songs we sang.

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There was one smaller dinning room that was almost



overlooked but was too small for the entire chorus. One of the chapter quartets, **Good Company**, sang for them to make sure they weren't forgotten.



The Chordsmen gathered to car pool to the next singing location as we said farewell to the residents of Wedgewood.



Next stop, Primrose Retirement Community. The Primrose location was new to many of the Chordsmen, but one of the chapter quartets, **Bravada**, has performed there many times before, especially for Valentine's Day.

We were to perform in a special section of the large dinning room where chairs had been arranged in theater style for the residents.

The program was scheduled to begin at 1:00 PM.

Host and helpful photographer at Primrose was **Havelah Feasley**. She made sure we had all of our questions answered and greeted the residents as they arrived.

Since we didn't have to move around to sing this time, we were able to perform for a full 30 minutes. The residents were very animated in their response to our singing.



The show began with "Sittin' on top of the World." Then, as is often the

case, the Emcee introduced the directors and asked if he could do some market research. He then asked the question, "How many of you have never, ever heard the Chordsmen sing before? About half of those in attendance raised their hands. The Emcee then asked, "Where were you during the last song?" That resulted in much laughter and really broke the ice with the residents.



The interaction with the residents made it fun for both the singers and those there to listen. And at Primrose, we met **Bill Woodrow** who sang with the Chordsmen in the mid fifties.

All in all, the Make a Difference Day for the Fun Center Chordsmen was fun. We ended the day with a

feeling that we shared our voices in song to make a difference in the lives of those at Wedgwood and Primrose.

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What does the future hold?

This past Monday night (10/24) I unfortunately was unable to sing due to a slight sore throat and its effect on my vocal cords. So I decided to sit out in front so I could get a better sense of the ensemble sound and hopefully offer critique, both positive and negative.

Trevor programmed songs from our learned reper-

toire and upcoming show tunes. As the chorus worked with Trevor on "Blackbird," the overall sound and visual performance was solid, as we would expect being a previous show tune. Riser etiquette was in place and



some good ol' fashioned woodshedding was at hand.



And then it happened. Trevor moved forward into 2017 show music and well, we took a step backward. Much to my surprise came a totally different chorus sound, mainly due to many members stumbling over the words and

notes. The confidence level sunk, right along with the pitch.

Many members stood there with <u>no music in</u> <u>their hands, no pencil to</u> <u>mark their music, and I</u> guess pretended to perform as though they were "off paper" and "test ready"?



If you were in attendance you know I concluded our evening by reminding everyone that we only have 12 full rehearsals, and five shortened rehearsals (due to Christmas music) left before our show in March. It



would have been acceptable if this were May or June and we just started, but this is almost November! We've had the music and learning tracks for five months but looked/sounded more like five days. I think the idea for going to contest in April

will be in jeopardy unless things improve in the coming weeks.

So, where do we go from here? I know for sure that we are better singers than what we heard this past

Monday night. We all know those moments from past performances that make the hair stand right up and gives us goosebumps. But what does it take to make that kind of reaction happen more frequently?



We must spend time with the learning tracks, at home or on the road. We must practice by singing in front of a mirror to check our mouth and how we shape our vowels and our facial expressions. It's really not fair to Trevor when we are not prepared. We end up

wasting his time, and ours! We can be better than this. In fact, We Can, We Will, We Must!

Below is a checklist we should all refer to on a weekly basis to hold ourselves accountable to our directors, our sections leaders, our section, and the chorus as a whole. While I support the idea that Monday nights need to be fun and an enjoyable experience, we also need to understand the commitment required as a member. Fun comes from making great music together, but this happens when every member arrives prepared, having put time in prior to the rehearsal. We **are** a great chapter, with great leadership and great members...why would we settle for anything less?

FCC Member Checklist:

- Do I have all my sheet music in an organized manner?
- Do I have all my learning tracks downloaded and available and do I use them?
- Do I check my email regularly for emails from the President, or Director,
- Am I logging into the FCC Member Only website <u>weekly</u> to view the Dashboard filled with Chapter news, recording my attendance at upcoming events, marking my music learning status?
- Am I spending time **at home** working on the chorus music, working on the areas that need attention? If I am struggling with a particular section of a song, am I asking my section leader or director for assistance? We can never be scared or embarrassed to ask for help.
- Am I letting my section leader and/or directors know if I am going to be absent at upcoming meetings or events?
- Simply put....am I personally doing my part to support the chorus.

From Top Gun to Chordsmen Rehearsal

A Chordsmen rehearsal focuses on developing a "Champion."

- Chordsmen have attitudes and perspectives very different from everyone else.
- Chordsmen expect things of themselves that most of us would never dare.
- Chordsmen rehearse and master their craft in ways that most of us have never tried.

A Chordsmen rehearsal redefines the expectations of both the group and the individual.

- Chordsmen expect nothing less than perfection from each singer.
- Chordsmen expect each individual to be responsible for preparedness and perfection.
- Chordsmen expect that each performance will be stunning.
- Chordsmen expect "standing O's" in every performance, which demands risk-taking.

A Chordsmen rehearsal raises the bar on individual responsibility.

- Chordsmen singers must know how to make every performance fabulous.
- Chordsmen singers use rehearsal to learn and refine both perfection and stardom.
- Chordsmen singers don't waste rehearsal time on remedial techniques, but own them.
- Chordsmen singers make the ensemble great only by demonstrating greatness themselves.

A Chordsmen rehearsal teaches the proper focus on performance skills.

- Chordsmen learn, in rehearsal, to recognize when they're wonderful, and when they're not.
- Chordsmen learn, in rehearsal, both how to recover and how to raise the level.

• Chordsmen know that "peaking" is no better than a "coin-flip, "standing "O's" must be rehearsed.

What a Chordsmen rehearsal is not.

- A Chordsmen rehearsal is...not...about winning a contest.
- Chordsmen can not control what other groups do.
- Chordsmen can not control the abilities or tastes of Judges.
- Chordsmen can only control what they do.
- Chordsmen know that, if they are wonderful, winning audiences or contests takes care of itself.

A Chordsmen rehearsal is not about elitism, or about not being a hobby anymore, or about not being fun!

- Chordsmen *didn't join* to be mediocre singers, and you didn't either.
- Chordsmen *don't ever enjoy* mediocre singing, and you don't either.
- Chordsmen have fun struggling and achieving, just like you do, in the magic arena we call a "hobby."
- Chordsmen learn that "quality" is a dirty word, only if we burn out, never having achieved it!

<u>Commit to a championship attitude.</u>

 $\underline{\mathbf{H}}$ ave individual responsibility for developing your own inner champ

Accept only perfection from yourself

<u>M</u>ake every rehearsal a preparation for your own personal championship

 $\underline{\mathbf{P}}$ erform, at all times, with the attitudes and techniques of a champion

Highlights of the JAD House of Delegates meeting.

1. Discussed Healthy Chapter Initiative. The purpose of the Healthy Chapter initiative is to develop strategies for strengthening the overall health of the communities of artists that comprise the BHS chapter structure. The district will assign resources as necessary.

2. Discussed District re-alignment. The JAD board now consists of the following board members: President, Immediate past President, Executive Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, four Board Members at Large, VP Administrative Leadership, VP Contest and Judging, VP Events, VP Chapter Relations/Fellowship, VP Music Leadership, VP Outreach, VP Technology/ Communications. There is no longer a VP of Membership and VP of Marketing.

3. Discussed Apple Corp for 2017. The decision has been made to have four regional sessions a year. The discussion is to utilize two weekends in four locations. A team has been appointed to review the details. They will be scheduled around the same time as the current Apple Corp. This will be reviewed each year to see how it is working.

4. Discussed Leadership Academy. The name has been changed. It is now the **Regional Leadership Academy**. The same location will be utilized. Other districts will be invited. The format of the sessions will change. The Core sessions are the same except that Outreach has been added.

5. Convention Update Mixed quartets are now able to compete at Conventions. The Singing Buckeyes will host the Spring Convention in April. The 2017 Fall Convention will be in Cincinnati.



Point to Ponder "Living in your comfort zone" An Editorial



In Stephen Covey's book, The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People, habit number two deals with using the whole brain. And states, "The left side of the brain is the more logical/verbal side and the right hemisphere is the

more intuitive, creative one."

Studies show that most men are left brain oriented and find it difficult to use much of the right side. We are about to be challenged to use both hemispheres of the brain.

For the past several months we have talked about the upcoming Strategic Action Plan retreat for the official board. In that session we'll look at the goals and objectives that need to be accomplished within the next three to five years if the chorus is to thrive and survive. And each member, must by necessity, buy into and work toward accomplishing the objectives laid out in the plan. Each of us has had the opportunity to have input to the action plan. Some have and many have not.

So what has this got to do with "Living in Your Comfort Zone?" There will be several objectives that we've talked about doing for years, but no action has been taken. Now is the time. The Action Plan is only objectives with time lines and responsibilities on paper. It means nothing if each member of the chapter fails to work diligently to accomplish them.

Yes, it will force many of us to do things we will not be comfortable doing. We've heard the excuses, "Oh I can't sell tickets or show ads." "Oh, I feel uncomfortable talking to strangers."

Well boy and girls, now is the time to put a **"For Sale"** sign on your comfort zone.

Don't misunderstand. We welcome all men of good character and who can sing, into the chapter. However, if we just come on Monday nights and are not willing to work for and support the organization, then in the future, there won't be a chapter.

I was part of the JAD staff when we had to take back a chapter's charter because they couldn't or wouldn't do what was necessary to gain membership - a chapter that once had 74 members. I did some research and found that the chapter membership began to decline when a single individual with a very negative attitude joined the chapter.

So it is hoped that each member of the Chordsmen will stand behind the work that the board has done and will do, in formulating a plan for future growth. All this while having more fun than human beings should be allowed to have.

I read Stephen Covey's book while I was working as the General Manager of Emergency Services at Sprint. Just incase you're wondering about the other habits, here is a list of them.

- 1. Be Proactive
- Begin With the End in Mind ~Envision what you want in the future so you can work and plan toward it. (This what is the Strategic Action Plan is all about.)
- 3. **Put First Things First** ~ What is important and what is urgent
- 4. Think Win-Win
- 5. Seek First to Understand, Then to be Understood
- 6. Synergize
- 7. Sharpen the Saw
